Getting closer to normal

COVID-19 vaccination appointments available at two Door County Medical Center facilities

After administering almost 12,000 doses of COVID vaccinations and helping to make Door County a leader in the state in vaccination rates, the Door County Medical Center (DCMC) discontinued its mass vaccination clinics at the end of April.

However, residents and visitors to Door County in need of a COVID vaccination may still easily get one through DCMC. Appointments can be scheduled at the DCMC facility in Sturgeon Bay for any time during regular clinic hours of 8 a.m.–4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, or after hours as requested.

In addition, DCMC began administering vaccinations at its Fish Creek location last month, during regular clinic hours of 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

“We really want people to get vaccinated to prevent another surge of COVID patients, and to protect themselves and their loved ones,” said registered nurse Michelle Johnson. As the outpatient services coordinator at DCMC, Johnson oversaw DCMC’s successful mass vaccination clinics.

Although Door County’s vaccination rate was 66.3 percent at the end of July—a close second only to Dane County, according to the latest statistics from Wisconsin Department of Health Services—DCMC is still focused on moving the county closer to herd immunity.

get vaccinated so we can continue to get back into a state of normalcy,” Johnson said.

DCMC offers all three vaccinations—Pfizer, Moderna, and Johnson and Johnson—to anyone over the age of 12, as recommended by the CDC. Johnson said people can book an appointment on the DCMC website, www.dcmedical.org/covid19, or call the clinic to schedule an appointment: 920-746-3700 if you are over 18, or 920-746-3666 if you are under 18.

The website also has a wealth of data about COVID-19 and up-to-date information about the vaccinations.

However, as Johnson also pointed out, the reasons for getting vaccinated lie beyond the statistics.

“Remember, we don’t do it for ourselves,” she said. “We do it for the people in our lives.”
